Read, Read, Read,

Summer reading should be FUN reading! Help your child read ANYTHING AND EVERYTHING that interests him or her, A great way to get started in by enjoinating the end of the achool year with a special trip to the library or a beokstore. Encourage your child to create a schedule for daily reading and set an example by letting your child see you read every day.

Finally... go to sleep!
