Regimes of Language Paul V. Kroskrity, 2000 In this text ten linguistic anthropologists integrate two often segregated domains politics and language It addresses the role of language ideologies in state formation nationalism and the maintenance of ethnic groups as well as the creation of national ethnic and professional identities *Sign Language Ideologies in Practice* Annelies Kusters, Mara Green, Erin Moriarty, Kristin Snoddon, 2020-08-10 This book focuses on how sign language ideologies influence manifest in and are challenged by communicative practices Sign languages are minority languages using the visual gestural and tactile modalities whose affordances are very different from those of spoken languages using the auditory oral modality Calunga and the Legacy of an African Language in Brazil Steven Byrd, 2012-11-15 Although millions of slaves were forcibly transported from Africa to Brazil the languages the slaves brought with them remain little known Most studies have focused on African contributions to Brazilian Portuguese rather than on the African languages themselves This book is unusual in focusing on an African descended language The author describes and analyzes the Afro Brazilian speech community of Calunga in Minas Gerais Linguistically descended from West African Bantu Calunga is an endangered Afro Brazilian language spoken by a few hundred older Afro Brazilian men who use it only for specific secret communications Unlike most creole languages which are based largely on the vocabulary of the colonial language Calunga has a large proportion of African vocabulary items embedded in an essentially Portuguese grammar A hybrid language its formation can be seen as a form of cultural resistance Steven Byrd's study provides a comprehensive linguistic description of Calunga based on two years of interviews with speakers of the language He examines its history and historical context as well as its linguistic context its sociolinguistic profile and its lexical and grammatical outlines Native American Language Ideologies Paul V. Kroskrity, Margaret C. Field, 2009-04-15 Beliefs and feelings about language vary dramatically within and across Native American cultural groups and are an acknowledged part of the processes of language shift and language death This volume samples the language ideologies of a wide range of Native American communities from the Canadian Yukon to Guatemala to show their role in sociocultural transformation These studies take up such active issues as insiderness in Cherokee language ideologies contradictions of space time for the Northern Arapaho language socialization and Paiute identity and orthography choices and language renewal among the Kiowa The authors including members of indigenous speech communities who participate in language renewal efforts discuss not only Native Americans conscious language ideologies but also the often revealing relationship between these beliefs and other more implicit realizations of language use as embedded in community practice The chapters discuss the impact of contemporary language issues related to grammar language use the relation between language and social identity and emergent language ideologies themselves in Native American speech communities And although they portray obvious variation in attitudes toward language across communities they also reveal commonalities notably the emergent ideological process of iconization between a language and

various national ethnic and tribal identities As fewer Native Americans continue to speak their own language this timely volume provides valuable grounded studies of language ideologies in action those indigenous to Native communities as well as those imposed by outside institutions or language researchers It considers the emergent interaction of indigenous and imported ideologies and the resulting effect on language beliefs practices and struggles in today s Indian Country as it demonstrates the practical implications of recognizing a multiplicity of indigenous language ideologies and their impact on heritage language maintenance and renewal

The Return of Ideology Cheng Chen,2016-07-06 As a nation makes the transition from communism to democracy or another form of authoritarianism its regime must construct not only new political institutions but also a new political ideology that can guide policy and provide a sense of mission The new ideology is crucial for legitimacy at home and abroad as well as the regime s long term viability In *The Return of Ideology* Cheng Chen compares post communist regimes with a focus on Russia under Putin and post Deng China investigating the factors that affect the success of an ideology building project and identifies the implications for international affairs Successful ideology building requires two necessary but not sufficient conditions The regime must establish a coherent ideological repertoire that takes into account the nation s ideological heritage and fresh surges of nationalism Also the regime must attract and maintain a strong commitment to the emerging ideology among the political elite Drawing on rich primary sources including interviews surveys political speeches writings of political leaders and a variety of publications Chen identifies the major obstacles to ideology building in modern Russia and China and assesses their respective long term prospects Whereas creating a new regime ideology has been a protracted and difficult process in China it has been even more so in Russia The ability to forge an ideology is not merely a domestic concern for these two nations but a matter of international import as these two great powers move to assert and extend their influence in the world

Language, History, and Identity Paul V. Kroskrity,1993 The Arizona Tewa are a Pueblo Indian group that migrated around 1700 to First Mesa on the Hopi Reservation and who while speaking Hopi have also retained their native language Kroskrity examines this curiosity of language and culture explaining the various ways in which the Tewa use their linguistic resources to successfully adapt to the Hopi and their environment while retaining their native language and the cultural identity it embodies
