## major theories of child development

- Nurses should understand the child's developmental stage to design stimulating activities, appropriate toaching plans and promote the child's further development
- Child development is a complex set of stages progressing from basic to more complex levels of function
- Major developmental theorists have conceptualized development as a progression of sequential stages

While blood pressure increases with age

Temperature measurements

 Rectal measurement reflects the body's core temperature

 Oral temperature measurement is appropriate for child over 3 years

 A one degree elevation of temperature causes an increase in respiratory rate by 4 breaths per

## minute and increases oxygen need by 7%

- The most accurate way to count the heart rate is using a stethoscope and taking the apical pulse
- The rate should be listened to for a full minute to evaluate any changes in rhythm and to count the rate

#### Respiratory rate measurement:

- Young children use the diaphragm as the primary mechanism of breathing
- Observe the rise and fall of the abdomen to court respirations in children under 6 years of age
- Count for an entire minute

#### Blood pressure measurement:

- · Use the right sized cuff
- If the blood pressure is measured in the lower extension, remember it will be slightly higher than the pressure in the arms

## pain assessment in children

- Pain exists when the patient says it does
- In the past, children did not receive adequate pain relief, it was thought that children do not feel pain the same way as adults.
- Research has shown that children feel and remember pain
- Children demonstrate anticipatory fear when taken to a location where they once experienced pain

Recognize that children often do not complain of pain because they are afraid the injection to relieve that pain will hurt more than the pain itself

- A variety of factors can affect a child's response to pain, including:
- · Culture
- Developmental level
- Previous experience with pain
- · Presence of the caregiver
- Fear and expectations
  Teaching or preparation
- Clinical manifestations of pain in children can
- be remembered as the ABC's of pain: • Acute physiologic indicators. Pain stimulates the adverge nervous system, causing a stress response as evidenced by tachycardia, tachypnes, hypertension, diation of pupils, pallor and increased perspiration
- Behavioral indicators. Pain related behaviors may mimic signs of fear and anxiety in the child, commonly observed behaviors include: restlessness and agitation or hyperalertness, short attention span, instability, facual grimacing, putting and bring of lips, guarding of painful area,

posturing or immobility, rubbing the painful area, lethangy or withdrawal and sleep disturbances Z

- Consequences of pain. Unvelleved pain is stressful and a protonged stress response has physiologic consequences, including respiratory changes resulting in alkaloss, decreased oxygen saturation, and retention of pulmonary secretions; networkogic changes resulting in change in the patterns, increased blood glucose and cortisol levels and tachycardia; and metabolic changes leading to increased fluid and electrolyte losses.
- A child may not be able to verbalize the existence of pain
- Careful, comprehensive assessment by the nurse is important
- The goal of pain assessment is to collect accurate data about the location and intensity of pain and its effect on the child's overall well-being
- Important questions to consider during the data collection process include:
- What is happening to cause pain?
- What external factors could be causing pain?
- Is the child exhibiting any acute physiologic or behavioral indicators of pain?
- How is the child responding to the situation?
- How does the child or parent rate the pain?
- A child's response, verbal description and understanding of pain vary by developmental stage
