*Maximus Poems IV, V, VI* by Charles Olson Charles Olson, 1968 Maximus Poems IV, V, VI Charles Olson, 1968 Late modernist poetics Anthony Mellors, 2024-06-04 This book explores the uncanny afterlife of modernist ideals in the second half of the twentieth century Rejecting the familiar notion that modernism dissolved during the 1930s it argues that the fusion of rationalism and mysticism which characterises modernist poetics was sustained long after its politics had been discredited by the events of World War Two The book's central concern is why the aesthetic mysticism that Walter Benjamin called the faith of those who made common cause with Fascism continued to be a guiding principle for literary elites and countercultural movements alike New light is shed on the relationship between occultism and the Pound tradition especially in terms of Pound's influence on post 1945 Anglo American poetry and a critical theory of late modernism is offered which shows how belated notions of cultural redemption have survived in contemporary poetry This wide ranging contextual study focuses on the poetry of Ezra Pound Charles Olson Paul Celan and J H Prynne and explores the development of modernist culture through its theories of phenomenology psychoanalysis science ethnography and ancient history *The Maximus Poems* Charles Olson, 1983 The Maximus Poems is one of the high achievements of twentieth century American letters and an essential poem in the postmodern canon It stands out in Hayden Carruth's words as a huge and truly angelic effort matching the dimensions of its hero's name and returning poetry to its Homeric and Hesiodic scope This complete edition of The Maximus Poems brings together the three volumes of Charles Olson's long poem originally published in 1960 1968 and 1975 and long out of print in an authoritative version edited according to the highest standards of textual criticism Errors in the previous editions have been corrected twenty nine new poems added and the sequence of the final poems modified in the light of the editor's research among the poet's papers University of California Press *Charles Olson* Paul Christensen, 2014-03-24 Charles Olson was an important force behind the raucous explicit jaunty style of much of twentieth century poetry in America This study makes a major contribution to our understanding of his life and work Paul Christensen draws upon a wide variety of source materials from letters unpublished essays and fragments and sketches from the Olson Archives to the full range of Olson's published prose and poetry Under Christensen's critical examination Olson emerges as a stunning theorist and poet whose erratic and often unfinished writings obscured his provocative intellect and the coherence of his perspective on the arts Soon after World War II Olson emerged as one of America's leading poets with his revolutionary document on poetics Projective Verse and his now classic poem The Kingfishers both of which declared a new set of techniques for verse composition Throughout the 1950s Olson wrote many polemical essays on literature history aesthetics and philosophy that outlined a new stance to experience he called objectism A firm advocate of spontaneous self expression in the arts Olson regarded the poet's return to an intense declaration of individuality as a force to combat the decade's insistence on conformity Throughout his life Olson fought against the depersonalization of the artist in the modern

age his resources raw verve and unedited tumultuous lyricism were weapons he used against generalized life and identity This volume begins with an overview of Olson's life from his early years as a student at Harvard through his short lived political career his rectorship at Black Mountain College and his retirement to Gloucester to finish writing the Maximus poems Christensen provides a systematic review of Olson's prose works including a close examination of his brilliant monograph on Melville Call Me Ishmael Considerable attention is devoted to Olson's theory of projectivism the themes and techniques of his short poems and the strategies and content of his major work the Maximus series In addition there is a critical survey of the works of Robert Creeley Robert Duncan Denise Levertov Paul Blackburn and other poets who show Olson's influence in their own innovative self exploratory poetry

Staying Open Charles Olson's Sources and Influences investigates the inter disciplinary influences on the work of the mid Century American poet Charles Olson This edited collection of essays covers Olson's diverse non literary interests including his engagement with the music of John Cage and Pierre Boulez his interests in abstract expressionism and his readings of philosopher Alfred North Whitehead The essays also examine Olson's pedagogy which he developed in the experimental environment at Black Mountain College as well as his six month archeological journey through the Yucatan Peninsula in 1950 to explore the culture of the Maya This book will therefore be a strong research aid to scholars working in diverse fields music archeology pedagogy philosophy art and psychology as it outlines methods for close inter disciplinary work that can uncover the mechanics of Olson's creative literary processes Building on the straightforward scholarship of George Butterick whose Guide to the Maximus Poems remains indispensable for readers of Olson's work the essays in this volume will also guide readers through the thick allusions within The Maximus Poems itself New interest in the wide ranging and non literary nature of Olson's thought in several recent academic works makes this book both timely and necessary

*American Pragmatism and Poetic Practice* Kristen Case, 2011 Wittgenstein wrote that philosophy ought really to be written only as a form of poetry. American poetry has long engaged questions about subject and object, self and environment, reality and imagination, real and ideal that have dominated the Western philosophical tradition since the Enlightenment. Kristen Case's book argues that American poets from Emerson to Susan Howe have responded to the central problems of Western philosophy by performing in language the continually shifting relation between mind and world. Pragmatism, recognizing the futility of philosophy's attempt to fix the mind-world relation, announces the insights that these poets enact: Pursuing the flights of pragmatist thinking into poetry and poetics, Case traces an epistemology that emerges from American writing, including that of Emerson, Marianne Moore, William James, and Charles Olson. Here mind and world are understood as inseparable, and the human being is regarded as in Thoreau's terms, part and parcel of Nature. Case presents a new picture of twentieth-century American poetry that disrupts our sense of the schools and lineages of modern and postmodern poetics, arguing that literary history is most accurately figured as a living field rather than a line. This book will be of particular interest to scholars and students of pragmatism, transcendentalism, and twentieth-century American poetry.
