Rural England Barry Reay, 2004-06-08 Rural England is the first general history of nineteenth century English rural workers Barry Reay provides a fresh perspective on England's rural past reintroducing those often excluded from more traditional historical approaches and stressing the diversity of working communities and the dynamism of rural life Reay challenges stereotypes of country living arguing that the extent of localization is so compelling that instead of thinking of a unitary notion of rural England we must think in terms of rural England's Incorporating a wide range of source material Reay examines and explores both representations and experiences of rural labour including varieties of settlement and landscape types of work carried out by men women and children household survival strategies experiences of life and death leisure patterns repertoires of protest visual imagery literary representations Rural Women Workers in Nineteenth-century England Nicola Verdon, 2002 The range of women's work and its contribution to the family economy studied here for the first time Despite the growth of women's history and rural social history in the past thirty years the work performed by women who lived in the nineteenth century English countryside is still an under researched issue Verdon directly addresses this gap in the historiography placing the rural female labourer centre stage for the first time The involvement of women in the rural labour market as farm servants as day labourers in agriculture and as domestic workers are all examined using a wide range of printed and unpublished sources from across England The roles village women performed in the informal rural economy household labour gathering resources and exploiting systems of barter and exchange are also assessed Changes in women's economic opportunities are explored alongside the implications of region age marital status number of children in the family and local custom women's economic contribution to the rural labouring household is established as a critical part of family subsistence despite criticism of such work and the rise in male wages after 1850 NICOLA VERDON is a Research Fellow in the Rural History Centre University of Reading The English Rural Poor, 1850-1914 Vol 1 Mark Freeman, 2021-12-16 Drawing on the difficult to access pamphlets reports periodical literature and political tracts this five volume set reproduces in facsimile a large number of neglected sources relating to rural life in the latter half of the nineteenth century It is of interest to scholars in nineteenth century studies and to all social historians **Lord and Peasant in Nineteenth Century Britain** Dennis R.
