**Magubane's South Africa** Peter Magubane, 1978-01-01 A South African photojournalist records in pictures and text the experiences of the black man living under apartheid from the time of the treason trials of the 1950s to the Soweto riots of 1977

**Bringing the Empire Home** Zine Magubane, 2003-12-15 How did South Africans become black How did the idea of blackness influence conceptions of disadvantaged groups in England such as women and the poor and vice versa Bringing the Empire Home tracks colonial images of blackness from South Africa to England and back again to answer questions such as these Before the mid 1800s black Africans were considered savage to the extent that their plight mirrored England's internal Others women the poor and the Irish By the 1900s England's minority groups were being defined in relation to stereotypes of black South Africans These stereotypes in turn were used to justify both new capitalist class and gender hierarchies in England and the subhuman treatment of blacks in South Africa Bearing this in mind Zine Magubane considers how marginalized groups in both countries responded to these racialized representations Revealing the often overlooked links among ideologies of race class and gender Bringing the Empire Home demonstrates how much black Africans taught the English about what it meant to be white poor or female

**Vanishing Cultures of South Africa** Peter Magubane, 1998 Ten major ethnic groups are featured including the San Zulu Ndebele Basotho and Venda as well as several smaller subgroups This book describes the individual personality and history of each their education laws languages medicine and magic and their religion Over 200 photographs capture the vibrant color of ceremonial and everyday dress and ornamentation musical instruments dances and rites of passage art homes and work The remarkable metal neck rings and the geometrically beaded wire hoops worn by Ndebele and Ntwana women the sacrificial ceremonies of the Zulu the long pipes smoked by the Xhosa and the traditional hunter gatherer weapons of the San deep in the Kalahari Desert the details of today's way of life are recorded here in evocative pictures while former traditions now lost fill the text with the intriguing vital history of each group

Magubane, 1979-01-01 0 **The Making of a Racist State** Bernard Magubane, 1996 How did the Union of South Africa come to be dominated for almost a hundred years by a white minority That is the obvious but haunting question squarely faced in this remarkable historical survey by Dr Bernard M Magubane lie documents and analyzes the chain of events that led up to the passage in 1909 of the South African Act by the British Parliament the centuries long British subjugation of Ireland the impoverishment and emigration of millions of British citizens the discovery of fabulous mineral deposits at Kimberly and Witwatersrand and the Anglo Boer War with its strange resolution Behind those fateful events however were equally powerful ideas ideas such as class and race British imperialism and the notion of a Greater Britain and colonialism itself with its dehumanizing mythology of the Other And the advocates of those ideas were among the most colorful and influential personalities in modern English letters and politics The end of white minority rule and the beginning of the process of black emancipation writes the author are momentous events

Yet South African scholarship has hardly prepared the people of South Africa to understand the meaning of this change

**The BaNtwane** Peter Magubane, Sandra Kloppe, 2001 The little known Bantwane people are found in a tiny area in the north eastern part of South Africa Peter Magubane has captured on film this small group going about their daily lives working the land going through their various rites of passage bringing up their children The women wear their hair in the distinctive bicycle seat style which is decorated with squirrels tails rosettes Although certain Western elements have been incorporated into their ceremonies for instance a bridegroom will wear a Western suit while the bride wears traditional attire this isolated group are keeping their African customs alive *Women of South Africa* Peter Magubane, Carol Lazar, 1993 A photographic look at the women of South Africa from the inception of apartheid to the present chronicles historical and quotidian events including the 1956 march on Pretoria and a mother's grief over her son's needless death Simultaneous

or some other means of dislocating the South African economy acted to overthrow the white regime The obstacles the African opposition must overcome to attain its objectives whether by violent or non violent means are noted as follows the organizational weaknesses of the African National Congress principally due to an inadequate communication system ANC s lack of money which impacts organizers and their ability to travel and results in volunteers unwillingly using their own very scarce funds and most importantly a leadership divided by ideology by differences over tactics by regional jealousies and by personal intrigues In all these regards the African National Congress was seriously lacking which inevitably doomed its efforts to failure
