Realms Of Exile Nomadism Diasporas And Eastern European Voices:

Realms of Exile Domnica Radulescu, 2002-01-01 *Realms of Exile* brings together authors writing on diverse themes of Eastern European exile. The book defines the experiential and linguistic peculiarities of exiled people who share similar cultural, geographical and mythological backgrounds and who have suffered under totalitarian rule. The contributions discuss a variety of media from the soulful melodies of the Russian gypsies to the delicate sensuousness of Kieslowski's films as the authors treat some of the most crucial issues of our times such as political dissent and resistance, the fractured self, alienation and migratory consciousness. *Realms of Exile* is interdisciplinary and cross-cultural scholarship at its best, casting new light on the many nuances and variations of many of the cultures and ethnic groups of Eastern Europeans. *After the Fall* Noemi Marin, 2007 Noemi Marin analyzes famous writers from the area as critical intellectuals and exiles in order to explore the role of rhetoric and identity in writers' own experiences during the long history of communism. Along with examinations of discursive relationships among power, culture and resistance in works by George Konrad, Andrei Codrescu and Siavenka Drakulic before and after the fall of communism, Marin proposes specific dimensions for a rhetoric of exile pertinent to communist Eastern and Central Europe. *After the Fall* shows how critical works on identity, culture and communist history by the writers studied aid in reconstituting a rhetoric of dissidence, identity and legitimation in the public discourse of a changing Europe. The book offers a unique perspective on the complex contexts of political transition in which competing public discourse on freedom and democracy intersect with totalitarian regimes, unsettled societies and issues of resistance.

Polish Migrants in European Film 1918-2017 Kris Van Heuckelom, 2019-04-23 This study explores the representation of international migration on screen and how it has gained prominence and salience in European filmmaking over the past 100 years. Using Polish migration as a key example due to its long-standing cultural resonance across the continent, this book moves beyond a director-oriented approach and beyond the dominant focus on postcolonial migrant cinemas. It succeeds in being both transnational and longitudinal by including a diverse corpus of more than 150 films from some twenty different countries, of which Roman Polański's *The Tenant*, Jean-Luc Godard's *Passion* and Krzysztof Kieślowski's *Trois couleurs: Blanc* are the best-known examples. Engaging with contemporary debates on modernisation and Europeanisation, the author proposes the notion of 'close Otherness' to delineate the liminal position of fictional characters with a Polish background. *Polish Migrants in European Film 1918-2017* takes the reader through a wide range of genres from interwar musicals to Cold War defection films from communist-era exile right up to the contemporary moment. The Cinema of Andrzej Wajda John Orr, Elzbieta Ostrowska, 2003 Home to the New York Yankees the Bronx Zoo and the Grand Concourse the Bronx was at one time a haven for upwardly mobile second generation immigrants eager to leave the crowded tenements of Manhattan in pursuit of the American dream Once hailed as a wonder borough of beautiful homes parks and universities the Bronx became during the 1960s and 1970s a national symbol of urban deterioration Thriving neighborhoods that had long been home to generations of families dissolved under waves of arson crime and housing abandonment turning blocks of apartment buildings into gutted graffiti covered shells and empty trash filled lots In this revealing history of the Bronx Evelyn Gonzalez describes how the once infamous New York City borough underwent one of the most successful and inspiring community revivals in American history From its earliest beginnings as a loose cluster of commuter villages to its current status as a densely populated home for New York's growing and increasingly more diverse African American and Hispanic populations this book shows how the Bronx interacted with and was affected by the rest of New York City as it grew from a small colony on the tip of Manhattan into a sprawling metropolis This is the story of the clattering of elevated subways and the cacophony of crowded neighborhoods the heady optimism of industrial progress and the despair of economic recession and the vibrancy of ethnic cultures and the resilience of local grassroots coalitions crucial to the borough's rejuvenation In recounting the varied and extreme transformations this remarkable community has undergone Evelyn Gonzalez argues that it was not racial discrimination rampant crime postwar liberalism or big government that was to blame for the urban crisis that assailed the Bronx during the late 1960s Rather the decline was inextricably connected to the same kinds of social initiatives economic transactions political decisions and simple human choices that had once been central to the development and vitality of the borough Although the history of the Bronx is unquestionably a success story crime poverty and substandard housing still afflict the community today Yet the process of building and rebuilding carries on and the revitalization of neighborhoods and a resurgence of economic growth continue to offer hope for the future

Normalizing Occupation Marco Allegra, Ariel Handel, Erez Maggor, 2017-01-09. Essays that analyze the integration and segregation processes that are an integral part of the broader historical trends shaping Israel. Palestine Controversy surrounds Jewish settlements in the occupied West Bank and the radical national and religious agendas at play there have come to define the area in the minds of many. This study, however, provides an alternative framework for understanding the process of normalization in the life of Jewish residents.
