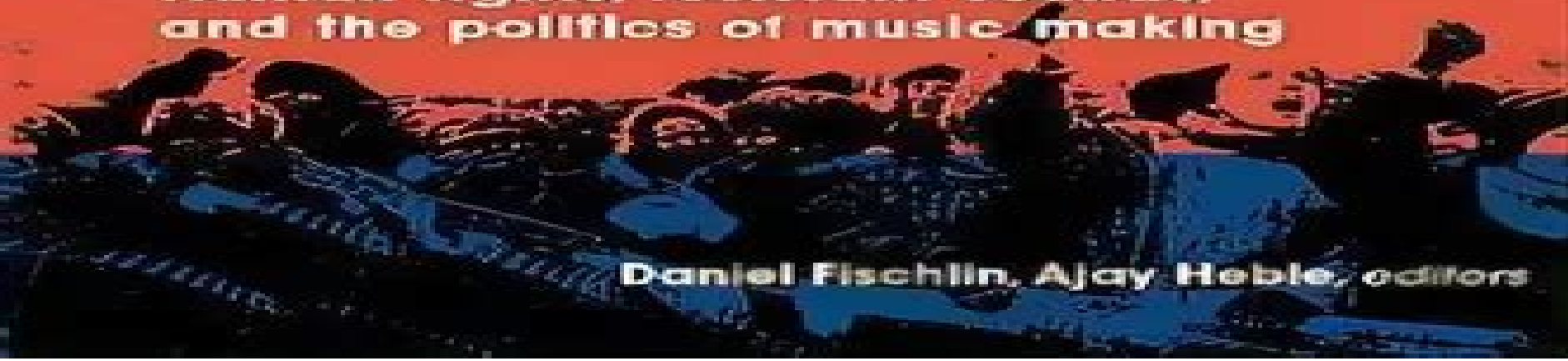

Yano, 2018-02-28 Musical sounds are some of the most mobile human elements crossing national cultural and regional boundaries at an ever increasing pace in the twentieth and twenty first centuries Whole musical products travel easily though not necessarily intact via musicians CDs and earlier cassettes satellite broadcasting digital downloads and streaming The introductory chapter by the volume editors develops two framing metaphors traveling musics and making waves The wave making metaphor illuminates the ways that traveling musics traverse flows of globalization and migration initiating change and generating
