**Pidgin and Creole Linguistics in the Twenty-first Century** Glenn G. Gilbert, 2002 Creolistics an important branch of language contact theory and sociolinguistics is one of the most socially engaged areas of language study today Pidgin and Creole Linguistics in the Twenty First Century explores where the field is headed in the new century in the judgment of eleven leading scholars At the same time the authors look backward toward the migrations starting five hundred years ago of Old World people to the Western Hemisphere and elsewhere and the strange turns the European colonial languages underwent here Their analyses underscore our belief that language change can only be understood in its social context even though those changes often took place under horrifying conditions that were illegal even under the laws of the time

**Creoles, Contact, and Language Change** Geneviève Escure, Armin Schwegler, 2004-10-13 This volume contains a selection of fifteen papers presented at three consecutive meetings of the Society for Pidgin and Creole Linguistics held in Washington D C January 2001 Coimbra Portugal June 2001 and San Francisco January 2002 The fifteen articles offer a balanced sampling of creolists current research interests All of the contributions address questions directly relevant to pidgin creole studies and other contact languages The majority of papers address issues of morphology or syntax Some of the contributions make use of phonological analysis while others study language development from the point of view of acquisition A few papers examine discourse strategies and style or broader issues of social and ethnic identity While this array of topics and perspectives is reflective of the diversity of the field there is also much common ground in that all of the papers adduce solid data corpora to support their analyses The range of languages analyzed spans the planet as approximately twenty contact varieties are studied in this volume

**A grammar of Pichi** Kofi Yakpo, 2019 Pichi is an Afro Caribbean English lexifier Creole spoken on the island of Bioko Equatorial Guinea It is an offshoot of 19th century Krio Sierra Leone and shares many characteristics with West African relatives like Nigerian Pidgin Cameroon Pidgin and Ghanaian Pidgin English as well as with the English lexifier creoles of the insular and continental Caribbean This comprehensive description presents a detailed analysis of the grammar and phonology of Pichi It also includes a collection of texts and wordlists Pichi features a nominative accusative alignment SVO word order adjective noun order prenominal determiners and prepositions The language has a seven vowel system and twenty two consonant phonemes Pichi has a two tone system with tonal minimal pairs morphological tone and tonal processes The morphological structure is largely isolating Pichi has a rich system of tense aspect mood marking an indicative subjunctive opposition and a complex copular system with several suppletive forms Many features align Pichi with the Atlantic Congo languages spoken in the West African littoral zone At the same time characteristics like the prenominal position of adjectives and determiners show a typological overlap with its lexifier English while extensive contact with Spanish has left an imprint on the lexicon and grammar as well

Pidgins and Creoles Jacques Arends, Pieter Muysken, Norval Smith, 1994-12-20 This introduction to the linguistic study of pidgin and creole languages is clearly designed as an introductory course book It does not demand a high level of previous linguistic knowledge Part I General Aspects and Part II Theories of Genesis constitute the core for presentation and discussion in the classroom while Part III Sketches of Individual Languages such as Eskimo Pidgin Haitian Saramaccan Shaba Swahili Fa d Ambu Papiamentu Sranan Berbice Dutch and Part IV Grammatical Features such as TMA particles and auxiliaries noun phrases reflexives serial verbs fronting can form the basis for further exploration A concluding chapter draws together the different strands of argumentation and the annotated list provides the background information on several hundred pidgins creoles and mixed languages Diversity rather than unity is taken to be the central theme and for the first time in an

introduction to pidgins and creoles the Atlantic creoles receive the attention they deserve Pidgins are not treated as necessarily an intermediate step on the way to creoles but as linguistic entities in their own right with their own characteristics In addition to pidgins mixed languages are treated in a separate chapter Research on pidgin and creole languages during the past decade has yielded an abundance of uncovered material and new insights This introduction written jointly by the creolists of the University of Amsterdam could not have been written without recourse to this new material

**Creole Formation as Language Contact** Bettina Migge, 2003-01-01 The research on the formation of radical creoles has seen an unprecedented intensification and diversification in the last 20 years This book discusses illustrates and evaluates current research on creole formation based on an in depth investigation of the processes and mechanisms that contributed to the emergence of the morphosyntactic system of the creoles of Suriname The study draws on a rich corpus of a natural conversational and elicited synchronic linguistic data from the Eastern Maroon Creole EMC and its main African substrate language Gbe b published diachronic data from the EMC s sister language Sranan Tongo and c information on the early history of Suriname coming from socio historical investigations It suggests that mechanisms of deliberate and contact induced change also involved in borrowing and particularly shift situations led to the initial formation of the creoles of Suriname while language internal change played a role in their subsequent development

**Word-formation and Creolisation** Maria Braun, 2009 This book explores a relatively little investigated area of creole languages word formation It provides the most comprehensive account so far of the word formation patterns of an English based creole language Sranan as found in its earliest sources and compares them with the patterns attested in the input languages One of the few studies of creole morphology based on historical data the book discusses the theoretical problems arising with the historical analysis of creole word formation and provides an analysis along the lines of Booij s 2005 2007 Construction Morphology in which the assumed boundaries between affixation compounding and syntactic constructions play a very minor role It shows that Early Sranan word formation is characterised by the absence of superstrate derivational affixes the use of free morphemes as derivational markers and of compounding as the major word formation strategy The emergence of Early Sranan word formation involved multiple sources the input languages universals language internal development and different mechanisms reanalysis of free morphemes as derivational markers adaptation of superstrate complex words transfer from the substrates and the creation of innovations The findings render untenable theoretical accounts of creole genesis based on one explanatory factor such as superstrate or substrate influence
