Drama and Painting in Renaissance Italy* Kristin Phillips-Court,2016-12-05 Proposing an original and important reconceptualization of Italian Renaissance drama Kristin Phillips Court here explores how the intertextuality of major works of Italian dramatic literature is not only poetic but also figurative She argues that not only did the painterly gaze so prevalent in

fifteenth and sixteenth century devotional art portraiture and visual allegory inform humanistic theories practices and themes it also led prominent Italian intellectuals to write visually evocative works of dramatic literature whose topical plots and structures provide only a fraction of their cultural significance Through a combination of interpretive literary criticism art historical analysis and cultural and intellectual historiography Phillips Court offers detailed readings of individual plays juxtaposed with specific developments and achievements in the realm of painting Revealing more than historical connections between artists and poets such as Tasso and Giorgione Mantegna and Trissino Michelangelo and Caro or Bruno and Caravaggio the author locates the history of Renaissance art and drama securely within the history of ideas She provides us with a story about the emergence and eventual disintegration of Italian Renaissance drama as a rigorously philosophical and empirical form Considering rhetorical philosophical ethical religious political ideological and aesthetic dimensions of each of the plays she treats Kristin Phillips Court draws our attention to the intermedial conversation between the theater and painting in a culture famously dominated by art Her integrated analysis of visual and dramatic works brings to light how the lines and verses of the text reveal an ongoing dialogue with visual art that was far richer and more intellectually engaged than we might reconstruct from stage diagrams and painted backdrops

Mary of Mercy in Medieval and Renaissance Italian Art KatherineT. Brown,2017-07-05 Mater Misericordiae Mother of Mercy emerged as one of the most prolific subjects in central Italian art from the late thirteenth through the sixteenth centuries With iconographic origins in Marian cult relics brought from Palestine to Constantinople in the fifth century the amalgam of attributes coalesced in Armenian Cilicia then morphed as it spread to Cyprus An early concept of Mary of Mercy the Virgin standing with outstretched arms and a wide mantle under which kneel or stand devotees entered the Italian peninsula at the ports of Bari and Venice during the Crusades eventually converging in central Italy The mendicant orders adopted the image as an easily recognizable symbol for mercy and aided in its diffusion In this study the author s primary goals are to explore the iconographic origins of the Madonna della Misericordia as a devotional image by identifying and analyzing key attributes to consider circumstances for its eventual overlapping function as a secular symbol used by lay confraternities and to discuss its diaspora throughout the Italian peninsula Western Europe and eastward into Russia and Ukraine With over 100 illustrations the book presents an array of works of art as examples including altarpieces frescoes oil paintings manuscript illuminations metallurgy glazed terracotta stained glass architectural relief sculpture and processional banners

**Painting in Renaissance Perugia** Sheri Francis Shaneyfelt,2023-05-11 This volume offers the first comprehensive study of painting in Renaissance Perugia from the late fifteenth to the mid sixteenth centuries Showcasing works by Perugino Raphael and Pintoricchio as well as less familiar artists who worked in Perugia from ca 1480 1540 Sheri Shaneyfelt traces the influence and impact of Perugino s workshop in central Italy over more than a half a century She demonstrates why Perugia which has been overlooked in modern scholarship was such a vital center for the production of early modern Italian art Shaneyfelt s study also shifts the focus away

Waking to find himself shipwrecked on a strange shore before a dark wood the pilgrim of the Divine Comedy realizes he must set his sights higher and guide his ship to a radically different port Starting on the sand of that very shore with Dante John Freccero begins retracing the famous voyage recounted by the poet nearly 700 years ago Freccero follows pilgrim and poet through the Comedy and then beyond inviting readers both uninitiated and accomplished to join him in navigating this complex medieval masterpiece and its influence on later literature Perfectly impenetrable in its poetry and unabashedly ambitious in its content the Divine Comedy is the cosmos collapsed on itself heavy with dense matter and impossible to expand Yet Dante s great triumph is seen in the tiny subtle fragments that make up the seamless whole pieces that the poet painstakingly sewed together to form a work that insinuates itself into the reader and inspires the work of the next author Freccero magnifies the most infinitesimal elements of that intricate construction to identify self similar parts revealing the full breadth of the great poem Using this same technique Freccero then turns to later giants of literature Petrarch Machiavelli Donne Joyce and Svevo demonstrating how these authors absorbed these smallest parts and reproduced Dante in their own work In the process he confronts questions of faith friendship gender politics poetry and sexuality so that traveling with Freccero the reader will both cross unknown territory and reimagine familiar faces swimming always in Dante s wake
